

BARLOW CHURCH

(ST. LAWRENCE)

Dear Friends,

We will actually mark Candlemas a little early in church this year, on the 29th Jan, but as there isn't a January magazine I couldn't write about this any sooner.....

February is a month of small but significant changes in the natural world. The sunshine is becoming stronger and we can see the first signs of Spring around us, and it's a time of change in church seasons too as we move from celebrating Epiphany towards the beginning of Lent, with just a short break in between.

Candlemas, although it isn't well known these days, is one of the oldest feast days in the Christian calendar and marks the end of our Christmas festivities.

Also known as 'The Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple', it falls on the 2nd February, forty days after Christmas.

In past centuries it was a major festival with processions in the streets and it's not hard to see why. At this time of year, when the days are still grey and cold, but the hours of daylight are significantly lengthening, this remembering of the coming of the light of Christ coincides with the first signs that spring is on the way. There may well be connections with the Celtic festival of Imbolc too, as both mark the changing of the seasons and herald the coming of Spring.

Over time, other traditions became associated with the day, including a weather song:

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come winter, have another flight; If Candlemas bring clouds and rain, Go winter, and come not again. And a flower, too - snowdrops - are also called Candlemas Bells because they flower at around this time, their sharp green spears piercing the often frozen ground. Some people thought it unlucky to bring snowdrops into the house before the 2nd February.

But why is it called Candlemas? Well, the 2nd February was the day when the priest would bless all the candles to be used in church for the coming year – a fair few in medieval times! And people would also bring candles from their homes to be blessed too – blessed, so that they could take them home again, take something of the sacred into their own place: heaven in ordinary, perhaps.

The Bible story told at Candlemas is found in Luke Chapter 2, verses 22-40, where we're told of how Mary and Joseph visit the Temple in Jerusalem with their baby, Jesus, to fulfil the obligations of the Law. There they meet two elderly people: Simeon, a priest, and the prophet Anna who both recognise, affirm and bless the Holy Family. Simeon's faithful service and Anna's years of prayer and fasting have taught them that a life of faith isn't an easy one, but it was for them, seemingly, both fulfilling and fulfilled - so they rejoice upon meeting the Christ child at last. But this isn't just a moment for a lovely photo opportunity, for a shadow is also cast over the scene by some prescient words of Simeon. After offering a song of thanksgiving he warns Mary that the future contains pain as well as joy for 'a sword will pierce your own heart too'. Motherhood for her will not be easy.

This anticipation of Christ's suffering is also anticipated at the end of the Candlemas service when we process to the font (by the door). There we speak together of turning our gaze 'from the crib to the cross': it will be only a few weeks later, on 22nd February, that we will mark the start of Lent with Ash Wednesday services at Loundsley Green (9am) and Old Brampton (7.30pm).

You are welcome to journey with us this year through Lent, towards the cross - and beyond, into new life.




LENT BREAKFASTS

HOT WATER BOTTLE SAFETY

Are you using a hot water bottle to keep warm this winter? Warning: Hot water bottles can be dangerous and cause burns if they are not used in the proper way!

HOW TO FILL

- 1. When filling your hot water bottle, do not use boiling water. Once the water has boiled allow it to stand for a couple of minutes before filling your bottle. Filling a bottle with boiling water can cause splash back, which may cause burns.
- 2. When filling your bottle hold the bottle by the neck in an upright position and fill slowly to avoid water splashing back.
- 3. Only ever fill your bottle to a MAXIMUM of two-thirds capacity.
- 4. ALWAYS expel air from the bottle by lowering it carefully onto a flat surface until the water appears at the opening.
- 5. Screw the stopper sufficiently tight to ensure there is no leakage. Finger tight should be adequate.
- 6 Hot water bottles should always be filled by a responsible adult.

HOW TO USE YOUR HOT WATER BOTTLE

- 1. DO NOT sit, lie on top of or put excess pressure on your hot water bottle.
- 2. To prevent burns occurring use a cover on your bottle and avoid leaving it in contact with one area of the body for more than 20 minutes.

- 3. Only use a hot water bottle to warm up your bed. Take it out before you get in. This helps to avoid accidental burns.
- 4. The use of hot water bottles by babies is not advised and children should be supervised.
- 5. Elderly people, and those with sensitive skin or reduced feeling should use hot water bottles with care.


Check it regularly for wear, damage and leaks. Do not use if you are concerned. It is advisable to replace your rubber bottle every 2 years! Rubber naturally deteriorates over time and this natural process can be affected by how it is stored and used.

Now that you know to check, how exactly do you find out how old your hot water bottle is? It turns out that most modern ones come with a small flower motif that makes it easier to tell when it was manufactured.

Look out for a small daisy sign embossed onto one side of the bottle. The number in the middle signifies the year that it was made, which is the simplest way to tell if it's time to replace it.

Around the number are also 12 petals, one for each month of the year. Inside those petals are dots (up to four in each petal) which demonstrate the week of the month that it was made. So, if your hot water only has one dot in the first petal, then that shows it was made in the first week of January.

If your hot water bottle doesn't have the flower sign, you can look out for the BS safety standard, which should read BS 1970:2012. This means that it adheres to the internationally recognised UK safety standard for rubber and PVC hot water bottles.



VALENTINE'S DAY

Valentine's Day, also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is celebrated annually on February 14th. It originated as a Christian feast day honouring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine and, through later folk traditions, has become a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance and love in many regions of the world.

There are a number of martyrdom stories associated with various Valentines connected to February 14, including an account of the Valentine ministering imprisonment of Saint of Rome for Christians persecuted under the Roman Empire in the century. According to an early tradition, Saint Valentine restored sight to the blind daughter of his jailer. Numerous later additions to the legend have better related it to the theme of love: an 18th-century embellishment to the legend claims he wrote the jailer's daughter a letter signed "Your Valentine" as a farewell before his execution; another tradition proposes that Saint Valentine performed weddings for Christian soldiers who were forbidden to marry.

The 8th century Gelasian Sacramentary recorded the celebration of the Feast of Saint Valentine on February 14. The day became associated with romantic love in the 14th and 15th centuries when notions of courtly love flourished, apparently by association with the "lovebirds" of early spring. In 18th-century England, it grew into an occasion in which couples expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards (known as "valentines"). Valentine's Day symbols that are used today include the heart-shaped outline, doves, and the figure of the winged Cupid. Since the 19th century, handwritten valentines have given way to mass-produced greeting cards. In Italy, Saint Valentine's Keys are given to lovers "as a romantic symbol and an invitation to unlock the giver's heart", as well as to children to ward off epilepsy (called Saint Valentine's Malady).

Saint Valentine's Day is not a public holiday in any country, although it is an official feast day in the Anglican Communion^[] and the Lutheran Church. Many parts of the Eastern Orthodox Church also celebrate Saint Valentine's Day on July 6 in honour of Roman presbyter Saint Valentine, and on July 30 in honour of Hieromartyr Valentine, the Bishop of Interamna (modern Terni).



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
