

# **BARLOW CHURCH**

(ST. LAWRENCE)

#### Dear Friends,

"April showers bring forth May flowers."

In these days of climate change and more unstable seasons, this isn't a saying we hear much any longer! In the past though, when weather systems were a bit more settled, the verse did reflect what we actually experienced. Alternate sunshine and gentle rainfall was the spring way of nature. The sun



nurtures all that the rain has brought to life and in such a beautiful rural spot as Barlow, we see this bursting to life and renewal of nature all around us every day at this time of the year.

Last month, the church was in the season of Lent. This month, we move into Holy Week and then Easter. The word 'Lent' actually comes from an old English word meaning 'springtime'. It is no coincidence that the great Christian festival of Easter falls at this time. The word 'Easter' itself is argued by some to have come from a Teutonic (German) word meaning 'resurrection' or from 'Eostre', a pre-Christian goddess celebrated at the beginning of Spring. Whichever, the connection of the word with the bringing forth of new life has been firmly established.

Rain and sunshine: Rain may bring forth the fruits of the earth, but it is also associated with the tears of sadness - how many cinematic funerals do we see which take place in the rain! Sunshine on the other hand gives us the uplift of hope.

The Easter story, too, is that mixture of sadness – tears – followed by the sun – life and joy. The sun and the Son (God's Son) are bound together in our thinking. Without the Passion of Jesus (his rejection by others that led to the cross) there would have been no resurrection, no assertion of the life of God as conquering all.

In our own lives, too, since last Easter, most of us will have had periods of sadness, loss, difficulty, which at the time dominated our thoughts and sapped our energy. Some personal sadness, e.g. the loss of a loved one,

may never really go away, but the Passion of Jesus (his close and ever present love for us all) and the Resurrection of Jesus (his conquering of all those things which bind and limit) can, and should, give us a sense of hope, joy in the moment and a feeling of thankfulness that, whether we're aware of it or not, we have a God who loves us and cares.

I send every good wish for an Easter of joy and a sense of peace in the days following.

# **BARLOW CofE SCHOOL**

#### Latest news



Willersley Castle was the destination for the Sapphire Class residential at the end of March. This imposing former hotel set on a hillside above the banks of the River Derwent provided the perfect backdrop for our three days and two nights away. Our first day, we had a wander around Cromford Mills and found out about Richard Arkwright's pioneering work setting up the factories powered by water. We followed this with a stroll along the canal to Leawood Pump House. The children spent some time carefully sketching this, noting all the different shapes. There was lots of excitement when we spotted some pike in the canal too.

Then it was up to the castle to find our en suite rooms set in the mews. With sleeping bags laid out, we set off for our first activity which was the zip wire.





There were squeals of excitement aplenty as the children (and teachers!) whizzed from tower to landing platform. Everyone had a go and this set the scene for the rest of the activities with everyone having a good go at everything. It was lovely to see the children encouraging and supporting each other through all the activities.

Emilie Y5: On Wednesday, we did an activity called IE games, which was my favourite. IE games was basically fun/hard brain busters that we did with an instructor called Tasha. It was really fun. There were a lot of brain busters that required teamwork. One of them was a bucket that has 4 ropes attached to



it and we each had to hold a rope and work together to place it on a podium. The other activity that required teamwork was called the birthday

bench and we had to sort ourselves in different ways without coming off the bench. Also, there was a fun game called manner gallery. For that one, there was a stick that we passed around and drew something. If we said thank you after we got the stick our picture would get in but if we didn't say thank you our picture wouldn't get in. We also did other games like that.



Harriet Y5: On the trip to Willersley Castle, my favourite activity was the low ropes. The low ropes were lots of different obstacles. You had to go on a tight rope, crawl on two ropes, swing on tyres, slide along on things, climb and finally swing from log to log. All while your partner/trio would spot you using ninja squirrel and fists of friendship poses. Then we had to put Ned the head somewhere on our body and carry him over the obstacles. We did drop him a couple of times but he is only a basketball in a helmet.

**Thomas B Y6**: My favourite activity was grass sledging, in grass sledging you have to ride a sledge down a hill. An instructor or your friend would have to push you down the hill. At the bottom of the hill there was a line of tyres protecting you from the river. When it was my turn, I hit the tyres and went flying off my sledge. After about an hour, we went on a bigger hill, grass sledging was so fun.

Rosa Y6: During my time at Willersley Castle, my favourite activity was by far the rock climbing. As we scrambled up a rocky path that lead towards the climbing, I had a chat to our instructor. I asked what we would be climbing and he hastily replied a cliff!. Not long afterwards, we arrived. When my turn finally came, I clipped on my harness and started to climb. I loved this activity and I would love to do it again.

# UNITED FOR UKRAINE UPDATE

On the 26<sup>th</sup> of February 2022, after listening to a friend and business contact on BBC Radio Sheffield describing how he planned to help those impacted by the war in the Ukraine I knew right away that the people of Barlow and surrounding villages would want to pull together and support him and the people of the Ukraine, who just like us had been going about their daily lives until the brutal Russian invasion.

Although I knew that we were a wonderfully close community I couldn't have imagined the support from local businesses and individuals. The Tickled Trout allowed us to set up a collection point and for 3 days people donated hundreds of bags of essential items. I was helped by 2 amazing ladies who I know will be horrified if we print their names but let's just call them Jackie and Chelsea....and the team from The Tickled Trout kept us supplied with tea.

Fast forward almost 14 months and the war hasn't abated and neither has Ryk's efforts. The team of volunteers, United for Ukraine, as they are now known have worked tirelessly to raise money and send desperately needed items such as medicines, hospital beds, an incubator, wheelchairs, clothing, dried foods, cots and pushchairs and even recently body armour for an incredibly brave lady who helps get the supplies to the front line.

There have been several events to raise money including live music events, sponsored runs and a charity race night.

The charity now has their own vehicles (quite old and unfortunately not always that reliable) and a small team of volunteer drivers who ensure that all the donations reach Poland and the Ukraine safely.

United for Ukraine are always looking for more help, so that they can continue with their amazing work. There is a Just Giving page now available and you can follow their incredible journey on Facebook.

# **POETRY CORNER**

#### Home-Thoughts, From Abroad

# By Robert Browning

Oh, to be in England, Now that April's there, And whoever wakes in England Sees, some morning, unaware, That the lowest boughs and the brushwood sheaf Round the elm-tree bole are in tiny leaf, While the chaffinch sings on the orchard bough In England - now! And after April, when May follows, And the whitethroat builds, and all the swallows -Hark! where my blossomed pear-tree in the hedge Leans to the field and scatters on the clover Blossoms and dewdrops - at the bent spray's edge -That's the wise thrush; he sings each song twice over, Lest you should think he never could recapture The first fine careless rapture! And though the fields look rough with hoary dew, All will be gay when noontide wakes anew The buttercups, the little children's dower, - Far brighter than this gaudy melon-flower!

This poem was written in 1845 while Browning was on a visit to northern Italy, and was first published in his *Dramatic Romances and Lyrics*. It is considered an exemplary work of Romantic literature for its evocation of a sense of longing and sentimental references to natural beauty.

Home Thoughts From Abroad is written as a first person, in which the speaker expresses feelings of homesickness through sentimental references to the English countryside. The poem's opening lines are renowned for their evocation of patriotic nostalgia:

Oh, to be in England Now that April's there

Browning makes sentimental references to the flora of an English springtime, including brushwood, elm trees and pear tree blossom and to the sound of birdsong from chaffinches, whitethroats, swallows and thrushes. The speaker in the poem concludes by stating that the blooming English buttercups will be brighter than the "gaudy melon-flower" seen growing in Italy.

#### **SPRING**

### By Edna St. Vincent Millay (1892-1950)

TO what purpose, April, do you return again? Beauty is not enough.

You can no longer quiet me with the redness Of little leaves opening stickily.

I know what I know.

The sun is hot on my neck as I observe

The spikes of the crocus.

The smell of the earth is good.

It is apparent that there is no death.

But what does that signify?

Not only under ground are the brains of men

Eaten by maggots.

Life in itself

Is nothing,

An empty cup, a flight of uncarpeted stairs.

It is not enough that yearly, down this hill,

April

Comes like an idiot, babbling and strewing flowers.

# SPAGHETTI HARVEST

It has been widely reported in the media recently that the supply of some fresh vegetables and fruit has been affected by severe drought in parts of the world we import our food from. This has led to empty supermarket shelves and voices urging farmers and allotment owners to produce more home-grown food.

One Barlow farmer has decided to follow government advice by growing a very popular variety of food on local soil this year for the first time. The plants had to be adapted to thrive in our British climate.

He says: "I'm taking a bit of a risk with this. I think I am the first trying to grow this crop in Derbyshire. It may or may not work, but I will try my best to make sure we can have a successful spaghetti harvest later this year. This experiment will hopefully mean that we will be able to become less reliable on imports from other countries in the future."

We have spoken to Millthorpe Nursery and they have said that they are anticipating interest in this crop from local residents with vegetable plots, so they are going to cultivate spaghetti plants, in greenhouses first, to be ready for planting out in early summer. Hobby gardeners and allotment holders who want to have a go at adding this crop to the vegetables they grow already are welcome to order some plants in advance. Demand is expected to be high and supplies will be limited; the advice is to get in touch with them early to register interest and reserve some plants.

# **APRIL FOOLS' DAY**

**April Fools' Day** or **All Fools' Day** is an annual custom on 1<sup>st</sup> April consisting of practical jokes and hoaxes. Jokesters often expose their actions by shouting "April Fool!" at the recipient. Mass media can be involved with these pranks, which may be revealed as such the following day. The custom of setting aside a day for playing harmless pranks upon one's neighbour has been relatively common in the world historically.

In the UK, an April Fool prank is sometimes later revealed by shouting "April fool!" at the recipient, who becomes the "April fool". A study in the 1950s, by folklorists Iona and Peter Opie, found that in the UK, and in countries whose traditions derived from the UK, this continues to be the practice, with the custom ceasing at noon, after which time it is no longer acceptable to play pranks. Thus a person playing a prank after midday is considered the "April fool" themselves.

In Scotland, April Fools' Day was originally called "Huntigowk Day". The name is a corruption of "hunt the gowk", gowk being Scots for a cuckoo or a foolish person; alternative terms in Gaelic would be Là na Gocaireachd, "gowking day", or Là Ruith na Cuthaige, "the day of running the cuckoo". The traditional prank is to ask someone to deliver a sealed message that supposedly requests help of some sort. In fact, the message reads "Dinna laugh, dinna smile. Hunt the gowk another mile." The recipient, upon reading it, will explain they can only help if they first contact another person, and they send the victim to this next person with an identical message, with the same result.

In England a "fool" is known by a few different names around the country, including "noodle", "gob", "gobby", or "noddy".

#### **Ireland**

In Ireland, it was traditional to entrust the victim with an "important letter" to be given to a named person. That person would read the letter, then ask the victim to take it to someone else, and so on. The letter when opened contained the words "send the fool further".

A common prank is to carefully remove the cream from an Oreo and replace it with toothpaste...

Barlow now has its very own author, local resident Jon Cook.


Jon has employed all his skills as a teacher of geography in writing his book "Bordering on the Ridiculous" which was six years in the writing.

Jon's book is packed with many interesting facts and anecdotes, both quirky and amusing, all relating to various borders, walls, fences and crossings etc. around the world.


