

CORONATION OF KING CHARLES III





The coronation of Charles III and his wife, Camilla, as king and queen of the United Kingdom and the other Commonwealth realms is scheduled to take place on Saturday, 6 May 2023, at Westminster Abbey. Charles acceded to the throne on 8 September 2022, upon the death of his mother, Elizabeth II.

Compared with previous coronations, the ceremony will undergo some alterations to represent multiple faiths, cultures, and communities across the United Kingdom, and will be shorter than Elizabeth II's coronation in 1953. The ceremony will begin with the anointing of Charles, symbolising his spiritual entry into kingship, and then his crowning and enthronement, representing his assumption of temporal powers and responsibilities. Camilla will be crowned in a shorter and simpler ceremony. The royal family will travel to Buckingham Palace in a state procession and appear on the balcony to celebrate the occasion

This will be the first coronation of a British monarch to occur in the 21st century, and the 40th to be held at Westminster Abbey since 1066.

Dear Friends,

Whether or not you are personally excited about the Coronation, there's no escaping the fact that something historically significant will happen in our nation on the 6th of May when Charles III is crowned King.

Like for many people, this will be the first coronation service I will have seen for myself: whilst I've watched TV footage from 1953 and heard the stories of what it was like (my dad watched it on the Vicar's new TV in a Somerset village hall), this will be different. Different, because I will be a witness and different because - well, the country is very different too.

This is a time, then, to reflect on our history, celebrate who we are now and look to the future – and the Archbishop of Canterbury's Reconciliation Ministry¹ team has offered some helpful ways for people to think about what this looks like in practice as they gather for community events such as the Sunday morning Mass or village picnic in the afternoon.

The ideas are framed as three 'habits' – ways of being. Perhaps you might find the suggestions and questions thought provoking too?

- 1. **Be curious**: try to listen to others' stories and see how the world looks through their eyes. Christians believe that every single person is made in the image of God (Genesis 1:26-27), with a unique story. When we are curious enough to seek out that story, we affirm that person's innate value. Curiosity disarms fear and avoidance and opens up new conversations.
 - Who might you meet and talk with over the weekend that you've never had a conversation with before?
 - When the community gathers together, who is missing?
 - 2. **Be present:** showing up and sticking around, learning to encounter others just as you are with your vulnerabilities as well as your

convictions and strengths. When we are present with others in this way, it helps to build deep foundations of trust.

- How might we sustain and build on any new connections created during the weekend?
- 3. **Reimagine:** the habit of reimagining encourages us to stretch our understanding of what is possible and when this happens, we can become more deeply rooted in hope and are led to new places of courage and creativity.
- We have much to celebrate in Barlow, but in what ways do you long to see change in the community?
- Can you imagine how that might happen?

There will be details elsewhere in this magazine of Coronation themed events, but however you spend the bank holiday weekend, I hope that it proves to be a time of celebration and appreciation.

And, especially, ...cake!

Commonside Road

Despite the announced closure of Commonside Road 'to facilitate highway construction' no work has commenced there. When the parish clerk enquired at Network Planning, Derbyshire County Council about the reasons for the delay, we received the following response: "Thank you for your email dated 10th March regarding Commonside Road Landslip and the attached photos. First and foremost please accept my sincere apologies on my behalf of Derbyshire County Council for the late reply and not updating you on this project. I will in the first instance arrange works to tidy up the site and re-erect the plastic pedestrian barriers. For your information the project has been delayed due to other more priority landslips and rockfalls on major routes in the county that have taken priority thus stalling this project. I will try and provide an update by the end of this month. I hope this answers your enquiry, but please do not hesitate to contact me if you require any further information."

Village Hall

We are pleased to report that we have been able to install a new climbing net and a replacement see-saw in the playground, courtesy of a grant from NEDDC. After securing another grant through DET funding we have also installed solar panels on the village hall roof.

On Sunday, May 7th, the recreation ground behind the village hall will be used to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III. From 2pm onwards, Barlow residents are asked to bring blankets, camping chairs and food for picnics on the grass. Refreshments will be on sale in the village hall and there will be bouncy castles, children's entertainment and live music.

Dunston Grange building development

Dunston Grange Action Group have asked us to share the following update on their campaign:

"William Davis, the developer for this project remains fully committed to gaining planning approval to build an additional 500 homes on their current development at the Skylarks Estate.

Since we first became aware of their plans, the members of Dunston Grange Action Group have been very active in challenging the proposals in great detail, not least with regard to the destruction of green fields and farmland, loss of wildlife habitat, road safety, potential flooding, and the significant loss of distinctive green space between the communities of Barlow, Cutthorpe, and Newbold. The impact on Barlow will be a significant increase in the amount of traffic as it makes its way through the village heading for the Peak District.

Over the past 18 months and more we have been gathering support from local residents around the area and you may recall receiving a leaflet through your door. This has resulted in over 600 objection letters being handed in to Chesterfield Town Hall which you can see by going onto the Chesterfield Borough Council website in Planning Applications and typing in the reference CHE/21/00549/OUT.

No date has been set yet for a decision by the Planning Committee, but it is long overdue and could well be within the next few weeks. We are planning to attend that meeting to raise our serious concerns and objection to the plan. As soon as the date is known, we will let you know by putting a note through your letterbox and asking if you would consider attending the planning meeting at Chesterfield Town Hall as a show of public feeling against the scheme. We believe that having as many people as possible attend the Chesterfield Borough Council Planning meeting will be a powerful voice and could have a strong and critical influence on the outcome. If you haven't already written in and objected, there is still time to do so, either by email to helen.frith@chesterfield.gov.uk quoting the above reference or by letter to the Town Hall.


took a break for lunch in the church hall where we escaped from the rain

OUTDOOR EXERCISE #WALKTHISMAY

May is national walking month!

Did you know that by using poles you can exercise the whole body too?

Using Poles for Propulsion

Nordic walking was originally a summer training regime for cross country skiers in Finland. It has gradually been adapted over the years to be more inclusive and suitable for all levels. The poles have a strap that loops around the wrist and thumb, and are used at an angle, which gives the walker propulsion. So not only will your joints have more support, but you can also walk quicker, which helps improve fitness, works on your core muscles, posture and toning the arms – all whilst walking. It makes walking feel easier even though your body is working harder!

Benefits of Exercising Outdoors

Outdoor fitness has many additional benefits. Did you know about 1 in 5 people in the UK are deficient in vitamin D? This is because of less exposure to sunlight and can contribute to loss of bone density. Exercising outdoors all year round (but particularly April – September) can minimise this risk. Being outdoors is a natural anti-depressant and by reducing cortisol levels it helps improve your mood & energy levels. Morning day light can also help to regulate good quality sleep & rest.

Pole Walking Fitness Classes

Billy & Jayne Ward (see the new advertisement on page 38) have included elements of Nordic Walking techniques into their Pole Walking fitness classes, which also encompass a range of other gentle strengthening, mobility, and balance exercises by using the poles. All with the benefits of exercising outdoors. The classes are held in Graves Park. There is a Wednesday morning wellbeing class, suitable for those with health conditions or new to fitness and a mixed ability pole walking fitness class on Fridays. If you like the idea of outdoor exercise, why not try it out.

Ann is new to the Steps2Wards Health pole walking fitness classes and said: "I was going for walks with friends and family but not at a quick enough pace to improve my fitness. I'm not keen on gyms. The first session was informal and friendly with super guidance from Jayne and Billy. I learned the basics of pole walking in a very enjoyable context whilst chatting along the way with lovely folk and the bonus of being outdoors."

BRITISH BUTTERFLIES

Butterflies conjure up images of sunshine, the warmth and colour of flowery meadows, and summer gardens teaming with life. Sadly, four butterflies became extinct during the last 150 years. Three-quarters of British butterflies are in decline.

The 56 species in Britain and Ireland are under threat today from unprecedented environmental change. Butterflies and moths have been recognised by the Government as indicators of biodiversity. Their fragility makes them quick to react to change so their struggle to survive is a serious warning about our environment.

Habitats have been destroyed on a massive scale, and now patterns of climate and weather are shifting unpredictably in response to pollution of the atmosphere but the disappearance of these beautiful creatures is more serious than just a loss of colour in the countryside.

Conserving butterflies will improve our whole environment for wildlife and enrich the lives of people now and in the future.

There are many reasons why butterflies and moths are important, both in their own right but also as quality of life indicators. The following are the main reasons for conserving butterflies and moths in the UK and around the world.

Intrinsic value

- Butterflies and moths are part of Life on Earth and an important component of its rich biodiversity.
- They have been around for at least 50 million years and probably first evolved some 150 million years ago.

Aesthetic value

- Butterflies and moths are beautiful. Many are iconic and popular.
- · People like butterflies.
- There are many references to butterflies and moths in literature, from the Bible through Shakespeare to modern day literature, and from poetry to musical lyrics.

Educational value

 Butterflies and moths have fascinating life-cycles that are used in many countries to teach children about the natural world. The transformation from egg to caterpillar to chrysalis is one of the wonders of nature.

Scientific value

 The long history and popularity of butterfly study have provided a unique data resource on an insect group unmatched in geographical scale and timescale anywhere in the world. This has proved extremely important for scientific research on climate change.

Ecosystem value


- Butterflies and moths are indicators of a healthy environment and healthy ecosystems.
- Moths and butterflies are an important element of the food chain and are prey for birds, bats and other insectivorous animals (for example, in Britain and Ireland, Blue Tits eat an estimated 50 billion moth caterpillars each year).


Health value

- People enjoy seeing butterflies both around their homes and in the countryside.
- Over 10,000 people record butterflies and moths in the UK alone, involving getting outside and walking considerable distances.
 Over 850 sites are monitored each week in the UK and collectively volunteers have walked the equivalent of the distance to the moon counting butterflies.

Economic value

 Thousands of people travel abroad each year looking for butterflies and moths. Eco-tours bring valuable income to many European countries and developing countries around the world (e.g. the valley of the butterflies in Rhodes and the Monarch roost in Mexico).

BUILDING UPDATE

Progress

The original schedule we set ourselves in 2021 was quite challenging. We were hoping that after receiving planning approval from NEDDC for the new Scout Headquarters in Holmesfield, building work could begin around April 2022. Unfortunately, progress has been slower than anticipated. Time and resources have been our main restrictions, a small team of volunteers have been spending large amounts of time and effort gathering

and preparing all the necessary information to make sure the Scout Group can be protected both financially and legally as we move closer to building the new HQ.



Fundraising

A separate group of 3rd Holmesfield Scout members are looking into fundraising to support the cost of

design, planning, materials and construction of the new building. Since we embarked on this project to find a new home for 3rd Holmesfield the costs have spiralled considerably. We are now looking at three times the cost from our original estimates back in 2018 and although as a Scout Group we are constantly fundraising to support activities and equipment for our members. The scale of funding we currently need means setting our sights substantially higher than our normal expectations.

Assistance and guidance from anyone with experience of fundraising, obtaining grants and contacting organisations for the provision of materials would be a major help, as without this the project is unlikely to succeed. Contact us if you are able to help!

Cost of Build

We have been very fortunate to have parents of scouts with skills and experience of building planning, design, and architecture. Along with support from their respective companies, we have successfully kept large amounts of the preliminary costs to a minimum, but we are now looking at a completed build cost of around £800,000 (exc. VAT). We are working with a building company, who are donating their time for the cost


validation, but are now at the point of needing to pay large amounts of money for specific design and build tasks. More fundraising is required before committing to these costs. Please contact us if you are able to help!




