BARLOW CHURCH

(ST. LAWRENCE)

Dear Friends,

The month of May is going to be busy for any of the many bellringers in this country. On May 8th they will be ringing to remember that 80 years have passed since VE day was celebrated and when bells rang out again, having been silenced during the war. Those of you who had waited through those bleak war days must remember the joy of celebrating together. Wherever you were, I am sure you have a memory of that day and night.

Hot on the heels, 18th May will be Bell Sunday and many church towers will join in festivities with teams of ringers busy with their art.

But what has that to do with Barlow? Barlow Church has only one bell. That may be so, but it calls out the same message as church towers with six, eight, ten or even sixteen bells. Something is happening. It says 'we are about to begin a service', be that for a wedding, a funeral or celebrating Mass. It says 'come and see what is happening inside. Come and join us'. And if it is a service of the Lord's Supper (Mass), there will be

bells rung during the Eucharistic prayer, two times three bells, sounding out to any who may hear, connecting the worshippers in the building with the community of Barlow and across the fields beyond. The bell rings out, saying 'Come and be part of the celebration'. As a child I remember hearing the bells of King's Lynn, St Margaret's and being rushed to the church railings to see if mother knew the bride's or groom's family. The bells made the event public by telling all who heard them that a new marriage was beginning: "Come and celebrate with us."

The passing bell, or 'tolling', for a funeral tells of the passing of a parishioner or one of the Barlow community. No longer are we told man or woman and their age, through coded messages of groups of bells, but if the bell is ringing midweek, it will almost certainly be a call to remember a life which has ended and to celebrate that life.

Barlow school also had a bell. The tower remains and I guess in days before watches were worn by all the villagers it rang out to signal that the school day was about to begin. The school logo on the school uniform features the bell, telling whoever sees it that they are looking at a pupil of Barlow Church of England School and we are surely proud of all that BCS does for our community.

Bells mark the passing of time. Big Ben sounds at 6.00pm and if you listen to Radio 4, you will know the bongs which unite the country, ready to listen to the 6.00 news. Of course, it is the same bell which so many will hear as each old year passes into the new year, from December 31st into January 1st, marking a closing and an opening.

Not so long ago pub landlords and landladies, of The Peacock and The Tickled Trout no doubt, proudly rang their bar bells, with the call 'time gentlemen please', so not PC these days and yet so much a part of an era in British culture. 11.00pm was the time to break up the party, celebrating was over. Thank goodness it didn't coincide with dusk, like a curfew bell, indicating that all must be indoors.

Over the next few weeks, when you hear a bell, stop to think for a moment and ask what is it saying to you? Is it the end of something or a beginning? If it is the church bell, what are you being invited to celebrate? Will you take up the invitation to join in?


Quiz Night




Stay vigilant for ticket fraud ahead of top events and concerts this summer.

Hello everyone,

In Action Fraud's new campaign, we are urging people planning to buy tickets or attend this summer's events and concerts to stay vigilant to criminals.

According to new data, £9.7 million was lost to ticket fraud in 2024 in the UK alone. Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a new ticket fraud awareness campaign, warning people to be alert to fraudsters trying to catch out people planning for popular and sold-out events.



Follow our top tips to avoid falling victim to ticket fraud.

- Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, official promoter or agent, or a well-known ticketing website.
- Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal give you a better chance of recovering the money if you become a victim of fraud.
- The password you use for your email account, as well as any other accounts you use to purchase tickets, should be different from all your other passwords. Use three random words to create a strong and memorable password, and enable 2-step verification (2SV).
- Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts offering unbelievably good deals on tickets.
- Is the vendor a member of STAR? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints. For more information visit star.org.uk/buy safe.

BARLOW CofE SCHOOL

This term we have lots to say thank you for! We are extremely grateful to

parents, friends and families of the school who have supported reading us in our with endeavours purchasing books from our Amazon wish list. As you can see from their smiles, the children are very excited about the new books. Reading continues to take a



high priority in school with a continued focus on our phonics programme, Little Wandle. We are very pleased with the progress all the children are making. Thank you to all the parents, grandparents and other volunteers who come in and support the children's reading in school.

We are also extremely grateful to FOBS and everyone who supports them through volunteering time, setting up and buying tickets for the Easter raffle, running and attending the pop-up craft club and all the other events that FOBS run. We have just been able to purchase a suite of 15 ipads and a docking station for them through the generous support of a £3000 donation from FOBS. This allows the children to work in pairs using the ipads and to be able to access some of the latest educational software.

Mrs Weston-Taylor has been hard at work in the school garden. She has worked with some of the children in Emerald class planting seeds and setting up vegetables. She is also keen to improve the garden further and has successfully applied for a grant of £250 from NEDDC. We are excited to continue the transformation of the garden area.

Lea Green

Emerald class had the delights of an overnight trip to Lea Green. We go there in both Y3 and Y4, so the Y4 children were able to lead the way and show the Y3 around the site. The children had an action-packed schedule, including buggies, low ropes course, campfire and skyline. The skyline is the most challenging element. Children are harnessed to a cable which runs freely around a hexagonal steel track about 5m up in the air. They then have to negotiate a series of hanging obstacles. Every single child made it around the course at least once, with some progressing to the more challenging course, which goes in and out of the middle section. To get down from the end platform, children go down the zip wire course. We were proud of the children's determination and 'have a go' attitude on everything they tried. Our instructor Jenny was very pleased with the children.

Willersley Castle

It was a similar story at Willersley Castle for Sapphire class's two-night residential trip. We had so many comments from instructors and catering staff about how polite our children were and how well they engaged with the activities. Our activities at Willersley included archery, grass sledging, aeroball and climbing. The unanimous highlight was the kayaking and canoeing. Willersley is situated on the River Derwent between Cromford and Matlock Bath, so the children were able to paddle directly from the site. Everyone had a chance to have a go in both the double canoes and single kayaks with an exciting mid-water swap-over point. The children soon got the knack of using the paddles and the communication skills needed in the double canoes in order to stay on track. Our second night finished with several goes on the floodlit zipwire which really accelerated everyone down the hillside.

We are so pleased that we can offer a residential trip in every year group between Y3 and Y6. We know the children get a lot from them and they certainly make special memories. We are very grateful to the staff who volunteer to accompany the children, as without them the trips would simply not be possible. Thank you to Miss Thorpe, Mrs McElhattan, Mrs Gale and Miss Jones.

We had a new team of parent volunteers who worked so hard with the children to create a RIO themed float. We had had a generous donation from SKYHOUSE business and were able to purchase a portable power pack which can be used for years to come. Our school float won many prizes, including best party float, outstanding float and a great school scarecrow. The float team would like to donate £150 prize funds to a new school project, run by Mrs Weston-Taylor, to support the development of the school's nature area. The funds will go towards creating a pond that will become a habitat for local wildlife. The garden will also feature planters and flowers designed to attract pollinating insects. Our after-school craft clubs have been a huge success! Due to popular demand we've added more dates. Not only have the clubs provided fun activities for the children, but they've also contributed to our fundraising efforts, helping us raise funds for future projects.

We're pleased to share that FOBS have recently donated £3,000 towards 10 new iPads for the school. These are already being used in the classrooms, helping the children with their learning.

Lastly, and most importantly, we're focusing on our next BIG project: Improving and resurfacing the school playground. The playground is in desperate need of resurfacing. Cracks and worn-out surfaces mean that the playground is becoming uneven and potentially hazardous and is in need of an upgrade. That's why we're hoping to raise £15,000 to give our children a safe, fun, and welcoming place to play again. As a small school our budget is tight and unfortunately we don't have the funds to complete this important project on our own. That's why we're turning to our community for support. Chris Mapp, owner of **The Tickled Trout** in Barlow, was cooking for fellow guests on the ITV show in the weekend's episode (Saturday 5th April).

The Tickled Trout prides itself on creating delicious dishes using locally sourced produce. In 2024, the venue received an AA rosette and was awarded Best Pub Restaurant Chef in the UK, at the Craft Guild of Chefs Awards ceremony.

Speaking on his TV appearance, Chris said: "I know James and have done demos with him presenting, but to be on the show was surreal, it was so exciting. I must say that the whole crew and James himself were just fantastic and friendly, so they helped calm the nerves a lot. I also travelled down with Alysia, the Yorkshire Forager, she is a close mate of mine, and that was a huge relief she was there to help me through it."

To get viewers' taste buds tingling, Chris prepared one of his signature dishes on the show: "I did our already-famous spiced cod scotch egg with curry mayonnaise, my homage to Cornwall when I was there with Paul Ainsworth. James is such a brilliant professional, it's very easy being with him, he makes it go extremely smoothly. There's always room for a chuckle as well during filming!"

Chris believes the show will help to put Barlow and Chesterfield on the map as a place to enjoy quality cuisine, adding: "The show has over 1.5m live viewers, plus those watching on catch-up, which is huge. I am sure it will put Barlow and Chesterfield on the map and I am hoping it helps the pub as well. Carol Evans

Stepping through the entrance of Carol's home, Middle Barley, on Wilkin Hill, you are immediately surrounded by fresh, green leaves, clinging to the walls, running up the stairs, appearing to grow throughout the entire house. Secateurs are not required, however, it's only her rather classy wallpaper. But it's a clue to one of the many strings to her bow, her love of gardening. I visited in early Spring, with her collection of magnolias still in bud, all set to burst into life with the magnificent, if brief floral display loved by people the world over.

Each of her garden plants has a special significance, linked as they are to friends and family still with us, or dearly departed. Since 1964, when Carol and her husband Barrie moved into the village, the garden has developed, taken many turns and continues to flourish to this day, much like Carol herself...

Barlow was a natural choice; Barrie's mother having been born here. Finding a home wasn't straightforward. Following the exchange of a cheque for a princely sum, paid to a man in the pub, Barrie and Carol took possession of a derelict barn, knee deep in manure and chickens. Very much a case of starting from scratch. Carol qualified as a cookery teacher in 1955, following a course at Leeds College of Domestic Science. Barrie had started a vending machine company, growing eventually to forty employees. But their early days in Barlow were long and tough, and with children James, Claire and Lindsay arriving through the 1960s, they had plenty to keep them busy!

None of this prevented Carol teaming up with others to contribute to life in Barlow in a wider sense. In partnership with Judy Needham, she founded the village playgroup, helped along by the indefatigable Sue Rowse and many others. The Parish Council donated six weeks free rental of the Village Hall, intensive fundraising provided the equipment, and they were soon up and running. Entirely the work of volunteers, this is surely what 'community spirit' is all about. Barrie somehow found time to join

local light entertainment troupe, Barmpots. A bit like the concert party in 'It Ain't Half Hot Mum', but with not quite so much eyeliner.

For many years, Carol also proved her worth as an impartial judge at the Carnival Classic Car Show. Knowing, as she puts it, 'nothing about cars', she applied her own special set of criteria. Who looked like they needed cheering up? Did the car match her Aga? How fanciable was the owner? Step aside, Mr Clarkson. Barrie did his bit too, serving tea and cake in the refreshment tent. Not a vending machine in sight.

In 2012, Carol and friends started up the Book Group, which has run successfully ever since, bringing people together who may otherwise never have met. Her love of cooking has been a common thread running through her life. Rack of lamb and venison casserole are her go-to dishes. Her Quick Lemon Curd has become justly famous, after appearing in a series of recipes contributed she to this verv magazine for four years.



Never one to rest on her laurels, after a long and happy career teaching Home Economics, she enrolled on a set of courses with her favourite cook, Mary Berry, which she thoroughly enjoyed. She also gained a role as a demonstrator in Sheffield's Aga shop, where her skills as a 'people person', as well as a cook, really came to the fore. There were occasional mishaps, the most notable being the time a Kitchen Aid malfunctioned during a high speed whisking operation, in front of an attentive audience of potential owners. Having managed to bring the machine to an unscheduled halt, Carol looked up to find she had meringued the front row!

There is barely room to mention the degree in English she picked up, as she says, 'almost by accident'. The philosophy class, her deep interest in Chinese art, a long tenure as a contributor to Barlow Open Gardens, regular lunches with friends and much more. But at the heart of everything for Carol has been family life. What a role model she has been. Endlessly supportive and caring, energetic, intellectually curious, always busy, continually connecting people. She's given so much to our village, as well as her family.

History is yet another area of interest for Carol and how fitting that her biggest hero is Bess of Hardwick, whose remarkable and mould-breaking life she has studied extensively. No doubt historians of the future will speak of another exceptional woman, even closer to home - Carol of Barlow.
