Dear Friends,

September is here again,

and so we come to the end of the summer, yet also a new beginning, that of the new academic year. For children, the end of the holidays inevitably means change, with new classes, teachers and timetables to adjust to, but for many parents, grandparents and carers, this time of year brings a more welcome return to the regular routine of school life. For others still, September brings a mix of excitement and anxiety for parents and children alike as they move to a new school or university. For nearly everyone, it is a time of change or new beginning of some kind – as even the seasonal colours, fruits and berries in the trees and hedgerows remind us.

In some schools and colleges the autumn term is still called the Michaelmas term, after the Christian Feast Day which falls on 29th September. In the CofE this day is known as the 'Feast of St Michael and All Angels', but it is also known as the 'Feast of Saints Michael, Gabriel and Raphael'. Michael, who is celebrated and revered in Judaism and

Islam as well as in Christianity, is traditionally seen as an archangel, one of the chief angels and messenger of God. As the captain of the heavenly host he is often shown standing on a defeated dragon, holding a drawn sword or a spear – an image from the Book of Revelation. As I usually include a poem as part of my 'Vicar's Column', here's a prayer poem for Michaelmas Day and a reminder of Michael's story.

Michaelmas Daisies



Michaelmas gales assail the waning year,
And Michael's scale is true, his blade is bright.
He strips dead leaves; and leaves the living clear
To flourish in the touch and reach of light.
Archangel bring your balance, help me turn
Upon this turning world with you and dance
In the Great Dance. Draw near, help me discern,
And trace the hidden grace in change and chance.
Angel of fire, Love's fierce radiance,
Drive through the deep until the steep waves part,
Undo the dragon's sinuous influence
And pierce the clotted darkness in my heart.
Unchain the child you find there, break the spell
And overthrow the tyrannies of Hell.



As a key date in the year, Michaelmas has long been significant as a quarter day on which rents were/are due. A Michaelmas feast would usually include a goose and in a custom dating back to at least the 15th century (according to Wikipedia!) tenant farmers sometimes presented geese to their landlords as part of the tenancy agreements. Another food associated with Michaelmas is the blackberry, in that traditionally it is the last day on which they should be picked. Legend has it that when St Michael defeated the devil and he fell to earth, he landed in a prickly blackberry bush – so cursed it and stamped and even urinated on the berries, so that they would be unfit to eat!

Whatever the legends and rituals that have grown up around Michaelmas, this key figure in the Christian faith tradition can still provoke a response. The author of the above sonnet, priest-poet Malcolm Guite, writes that Michael 'represents truth, discernment, and the light and energy of intellect to cut through tangles and confusion, to set us free to discern and choose.' As I try to follow in Jesus' footsteps and attempt to lead a good life, it seems to me that these gifts are something this world needs - and that we can all pray for, and welcome.

We are grateful to everyone who sponsored the flower arrangements, gave up their time to 'church-sit' or help in the kitchen and bake cakes or scones for us. The baking was once again outstanding, with many compliments being received from visitors. Thank you to Clarence and Jo for their ongoing support with providing milk and cream. And thank you to everyone who came to see the flowers and eat cake, there would be no point in all the work without you.

We are pleased to announce that the amazing amount of £5,240 was raised for Church funds by the Flower Festival. The collection on the Church well totalled £293, with half of it going to the Royal British Legion and half to maintaining the well for future years.

On Friday 15th we marked the 2-minute silence for VJ Day in Church and on Sunday 17th Reverend Gill gave a short service at the war memorial, followed by a very moving service in Church to remember the occasion.

The Local Plan


Dear Residents,

Council fully understands the concern of those residents who have recently expressed misgivings about land that is being considered for the proposed NEDDC Local Plan. It is worth pointing out

Sadly, at the end of the day, this is an issue, over which, we, as a Parish Council, have no control. Processing of it is totally in the hands of NEDDC and it is to **that body alone** that all views and comments need to be addressed.

The Clerk and the Chair will be attending a further meeting on this subject in early September. We will keep the village informed of any further developments via the parish facebook page and the noticeboards, as before.

JUST PICKLES

In August 2008, I'd just turned forty-five and life, it has to be said, had not been going well. A whole host of things had gone wrong, run out of control, been lost sight of. Worst of all, back in February, my mother had passed away after a sudden decline. I was lost in a maze, with no hope of finding a way out.

In the midst of this bewilderment, I found myself driving down the M5 to pick up a Cairn Terrier from a breeder in Newport, South Wales. With me in the car was Sandra, my partner at the time and one of her daughters, Ruth, who had already decided on the name of her puppy – Pickles.

Meeting the breeders was a surreal experience. They lived in a tiny, stoneclad terrace set in the narrowest of streets, with eBay running as a live feed on their enormous TV. There was a huge hole in the sitting room ceiling, as though a bomb had just dropped through it. Ruth was shown the tiny puppies one by one, most of them seemingly unaware of us, the breeders, their TV and the hole in the ceiling. One, however, stood out as very adventurous, as she tried to climb out of Ruth's lap onto her shoulder. 'I like this one', Ruth said.

Filling out the transfer documents before we left, we were asked, 'what do you want to call her?' 'Pickles', we said. 'Just Pickles?', came the reply. 'Yes', we confirmed. And so it came to pass, a few weeks later we received a certificate from the Kennel Club giving our dog's name as, 'Just Pickles'.

Like most Cairn Terriers, even tiny, cute ones, Pickles was strong-willed and feisty. A few days into their relationship, Ruth decided dog ownership was not for her, after being bitten, spiritedly, on the wrist. Reluctantly, I took over the care and upbringing of our new family member, a development I had wearily foreseen as inevitable.



I was taken by surprise, therefore, about three days in, standing under one of the huge conifers in the garden at 3am, waiting yet again for Pickles to perform, poo bag in hand. Looking down at my furry little bundle doing endless circuits, trying to find the perfect spot, I remember thinking to myself, 'isn't she great?'

Within a few years, Ruth and Sandra had moved on. My dear father had succumbed to heart failure. Pickles and I were now 'the team', along with Karen, a lovely neighbour across the road who spent countless hours walking and looking in on Pickles, while I was out keeping body and soul together in my exciting, if precarious new job as a freelance artist.



Pickles loved to walk. Day or night, fair weather or foul, we were always out in the park, pounding the streets or off on trips further afield. But life was hard back then. I was still lost in that maze. What I didn't realise at the time is that, step by step, Pickles was leading me out of it.

By April 2018, Pickles was ten years old and firing on all cylinders, albeit with a few less teeth. I'd somehow managed to pay off the mortgage and had developed yearnings for a life in, or as near as possible to, the countryside. Barlow was somewhere we already knew and loved well, but I'd never imagined we could actually live here. And yet, we arrived in November 2019, a few months before the pandemic. Perfect timing.

Resembling as she did a fluffy teddy bear, with bright, brown eyes and a sturdy, waggy tail, Pickles always attracted lots of attention. Toddlers squealed with delight when they saw her, adults young and old fawned over her. Even cool teenagers would melt, say 'hello' and ruffle her unruly fur. Dawn fell for her too, on Keepers Lane in June 2020. Along with her

little Jack Russell, Maisie, a team of two quickly

became a team of four.

Much as she loved a nap, curled up tightly on the settee, Pickles was a child of nature. She must have spent thousands of hours sunbathing on the lawn, keeping watch in the allotment, or peering out from a hidey hole she'd dug under the hedge. All credit too, to farmer Needham and others, who keep their public footpaths and farm access tracks well maintained and freely available to those who use them responsibly. A simple walk in



the countryside provides so much joy, for us and our canine companions.

Pickles made it to her seventeenth Christmas Day with me last year. She was sixteen and a half, I was sixty-one! A few days later, we had to say goodbye. Kidney disease had been creeping up on her for a few months, slowing her down and eventually making it impossible for her to gain any nourishment from her food.

Her passing was as gentle, peaceful and loving as could be wished for, for any living thing. But it was so painful for us, and still is. I am comforted, however, by the belief that her soul departed to somewhere beautiful on that sad day. And by the fact that she had such a long, safe and happy life.



I'd like to dedicate this article to the memory of Pickles and all the other dogs, and cats, and horses, lost to members of our village community. It feels as though more than usual have left us recently. All of them cherished companions, who leave a gap we can't fill with anything, but love.



to help me when my stouth gets muck. I should sit, perhaps, and bead a rook, fight a liar, or flick some powers.


No, I think I'll go and shake a tower.






