Dear Friends,

I saw a news snippet the other day about a terrible potential disease threat to cattle. The TV personality, Jeremy Clarkson, has a farm which has been affected. Although he has only recently become a farmer, Mr Clarkson has now, through his celebrity status, turned into an unofficial representative of farmers in general. This started me thinking about representatives and representation.

All of us are represented in the democratic way by a member of Parliament and, one rung down, by our County and Borough Councils' reps. But all of us belong to other set-ups of some kind, be they unions, firms, dedicated groups or whatever, who have leaders who lead and represent their organisations. However, we can turn this on its head and say that each of us represent some part of society, merely by being part of it.

Let's think, for example, about when we go abroad. Then, we're aware that we speak a different language and, perhaps, if we go to a hotter country, look rather paler than its inhabitants when we first arrive! We can sometimes stand out as being different. Then, we can feel that in some way we represent our country (Or is foreign travel so commonplace nowadays that we don't feel this anymore?). There can be a downside to this: football supporters going abroad and misbehaving and bringing their country into disrepute.

What about a homeless person in his tent on London's Embankment who is interviewed by a TV reporter? Doesn't he/she, by what he/she says, represent all homeless people?

We might stop for a moment to consider the group/s we represent.

So, is there anyone, or has there ever been anyone, who has represented everyone? Not just in our nation, but in the whole world? Well, actually, yes. The man born in Galilee over 2,000 years ago did and still does just

that. Above all, he stands in for the persecuted, the victimised and all who suffer or recognise a need. His mission was to demonstrate to others, by leading the way, what humanity could be and that in the end God's inclusive, caring way really works.

In our own lives (very insignificant in the world's eyes, but significant in God's eyes), we can all be representatives of this.

Attendance of residents at this meeting is usually poor, but inclusion of a discussion of the Local Plan should attract more interest. This meeting will be held in Spring 2026.

Local Plan - Update

The following update has been posted on both facebook pages relevant to Barlow. For the benefit of residents without computer access to the internet it is reprinted here in full:

MEETING ABOUT THE NEW LOCAL PLAN 4TH SEPTEMBER 2025

As promised, here is a summary of what was heard at the meeting on Thursday, 4th September.

- Currently, NEDDC are committed to providing 330 new houses a year. However, due to new government objectives, that target has now gone up to 600 new houses a year for the next 20 years. (12,000 houses).
- In a relatively small window of 2yrs, NEDDC has to provide the government with a revised Local Plan to fulfil this new target.
- At the moment they are halfway through the 2yr period. During this time there has been a call for possible sites and a Public Consultation, called "Issues and Options" (June -August 2025), when the public were given information and had an opportunity to comment.
- The deadline for completion of the new Local Plan is November 2026, at which point it has to be submitted to an inspector.
- In early 2027 the new Local Plan will be examined and, if acceptable, it will be adopted in late 2027 by NEDDC.
- Currently, NEDDC are very concerned as, in 6 months, sites allocated in the <u>present</u> Local Plan will have been used up. This is another reason why NEDDC need to push for completion of a new Local Plan.
- <u>Focus Groups</u>. These will commence in Nov 2025. If you would like to know more about them, please call the Local Plan Team on 01246 231111 or email <u>Local.plan@ne-derbyshire.gov.uk</u>
- Public Consultation. During the first 3 months of 2026 there will be another Public Consultation, in which it is hoped that NEDDC will include some of the sites that will have been considered viable for the new Local Plan. It is early days for this yet, but you might be given more information about it if you contact NEDDC on 01246 231111 or email Local.plan@ne-derbyshire.gov.uk

When devising a Local Plan, all of the following issues (not just housing) would be up for consideration.

<u>Infrastructure:</u> Roads, public transport, utilities, walking and cycling routes.

Environment: protecting green spaces, biodiversity, flood risk management, air quality, renewable energy.

<u>Heritage and Design</u>: protecting historic buildings and ensuring good design standards.

<u>Leisure and community facilities</u>: parks, sports, community centres and cultural spaces.


Employment and Economy: Land for business, offices, retail and industrial.

<u>Housing</u>: How much is needed, where it should go and what types. (affordable, family homes etc).

It would seem that there is still a lot more research yet to be done on this huge and complex project. As a result, sadly, we were unable to bring you any Barlow-specific information from this meeting. However, we hope that this summary might at least help to clarify a few things.



As we move into October we hope the new families and children have settled in well and are already enjoying everything our wonderful school has to offer.



SPIDERS

For the majority of the year, native spiders take up residence in our homes and gardens, but tend to stay out of sight (and, crucially, out of mind).

It's only in autumn, when the weather takes a turn, that you start spotting quite a few eight-legged visitors scurrying around your home perched in the corner of your shower or hanging quietly from the living room ceiling.

Thankfully, the vast majority of spiders found in our homes are completely harmless to humans, even if they can give us a bit of a fright.

Much like humans, spiders often enter our homes in search of somewhere warm to shelter. And, like all living things, they need water.

Mike Norton, Trade and Projects Director at Magnet Trade, says: "Spiders need water and moisture to survive. From sinks and dishwashers to the warmth given off from appliances, it's the kitchen and bathroom that create the perfect moist environment to draw them in."

As soon as the leaves start to fall and temperatures dip, you'll know a new season is upon us – but we're not just talking about autumn.

"September marks the start of spider season," says Hudson Lambert, pest expert at NOPE!, a UK-based insect spray manufacturer. "As the weather begins to cool, spiders start making their way indoors to mate. You'll usually be able to spot them first thing in the morning and late at night, when they head inside away from the cold weather."

According to Tap Warehouse's cleaning expert, Nancy Emery, "spider season usually lasts until mid-October at the earliest. And while we can't always stop them from entering our homes, there are a few natural remedies to deter spiders from coming near you and staying out of certain areas of the home during this time."

Spiders don't like certain scents. Using oils and sprays around the bottom of door frames and window sills, where they are most likely to enter and crawl past, can be a great tactic.

Both peppermint oil and tea tree oil have a particularly strong odour that the little insects detest. "Add 15-20 drops of either to a spray bottle and fill it up with water," Nancy recommends, and get spraying.

"Other oils that are useful in deterring spiders include those in the citrus family like orange, lemon, lime and citronella," she continues. "You can buy candles and diffusers that have a citronella scent but spraying the oil solution directly on problem areas is the most effective and affordable deterrent." Vinegar, cinnamon sticks and conkers are also thought to keep spiders at bay.

If you must, you can remove the webs you find indoors. "Spider egg sacs can contain up to 300 spiderlings, with some spiders living up to a year, so it's important to get rid of webs when you can," Hudson says.

Keep in mind that by destroying their web, you will essentially cut off their food supply and habitat, meaning that they can't nest or reproduce.

A spider-free household sounds tempting, but before you reach for a glass and a piece of paper, it's worth considering the benefits these little insects bring.

Spiders are an important part of the natural ecosystem and help to control the amount of pests that might make their way into your home – such as moths, mosquitoes fruit and house flies – which can cause holes in our clothing and curtains or even bite us.

So, if you remove all the spiders in your home, you could actually have more issues with pests than the odd spider sighting.

Easy and Beginner Logic Puzzles

1. Logic Puzzle: There are two ducks in front of a duck, two ducks behind a duck and a duck in the middle. How many ducks are there?

Answer: Three. Two ducks are in front of the last duck; the first duck has two ducks behind; one duck is between the other two.

2. Logic Puzzle: Five people were eating apples, A finished before B, but behind C. D finished before E, but behind B. What was the finishing order?

Answer: CABDE. Putting the first three in order, A finished in front of B but behind C, so CAB. Then, we know D finished before B, so CABD. We know E finished after D, so CABDE.

3. Logic Puzzle: Jack is looking at Anne. Anne is looking at George. Jack is married, George is not, and we don't know if Anne is married. Is a married person looking at an unmarried person?

Answer: Yes. If Anne is married, then she is married and looking at George, who is unmarried. If Anne is unmarried, then Jack, who is married, is looking at her. Either way, the statement is correct.

4. Logic Puzzle: A man has 53 socks in his drawer: 21 identical blue, 15 identical black and 17 identical red. The lights are out, and he is completely in the dark. How many socks must he take out to make 100 percent certain he has at least one pair of black socks?

Answer: 40 socks. If he takes out 38 socks (adding the two biggest amounts, 21 and 17), although it is very unlikely, it is possible they could all be blue and red. To make 100 percent certain that he also has a pair of black socks he must take out a further two socks.

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BOOK REVIEW

As someone who adored *One Day*, I was intrigued to see how David Nicholls would handle a quieter, more mature love story in *You Are Here*.

Nicholls excels at writing ordinary people with extraordinary emotional nuance. Marnie and Michael, both dealing with the ache of solitude and the weight of the past, felt incredibly real. Their slow, tentative connection built over miles of countryside was poignant and satisfying. The witty inner monologues, understated humour, and beautiful descriptions of the Lake District and Yorkshire Dales made it feel almost like a gentle rom-com with hiking boots. The dialogue sparkled with authenticity, and I appreciated how Nicholls allowed the story to breathe. There's a maturity here, no melodrama, just two damaged people slowly letting each other in.

The pacing may frustrate some readers. It meanders, purposefully, yes. but still meanders. If you're looking for big romantic gestures or dramatic conflict, you won't find them here. Marnie's inner world, while richly drawn, sometimes edged into over-analysis, and I occasionally wished for a bit more narrative momentum.

If you're in the mood for a grown-up romance, gentle, charming, introspective, *You Are Here* delivers. It's perfect for fans of slow-burn love stories, long walks, and characters who find their way back to themselves before they find each other.
