## Dear Friends,

## Happy New Year!

On 30<sup>th</sup> November, the new Church year begins and with it the liturgical season of Advent. The origins of this season date back to the fourth and fifth centuries: at first it lasted for 40 days to mirror Lent, but in later times the tradition changed and developed, so that Advent starts 4 Sundays before Christmas. There are special set readings for church services and the theme is one of anticipation and preparation, both for the imminent birth at Bethlehem, but also of Christ's promised return and the fulfilment of the kingdom of God – whenever that might be.

So Advent is both hopeful and thoughtful, with all flowers removed from churches and purple as the colour of church vestments and hangings: but as is our tradition, Sunday by Sunday we will light the Advent candles, with one new one lit each week - three purple and one rose pink for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday. The final and central white candle is lit for the first Mass of Christmas, which will be Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve.

The marking of the season in this way is intended to promote the idea of quiet preparation and an attempt to deliberately try to find (and hold onto) times of



stillness and waiting in the midst of the busyness. This can at times feel at odds with the world around, where Christmas songs have been on repeat in shops since the end of October - and yes, the Christmas Tree Festival will have ended just as Advent begins! But there is something very worthwhile about intentionally holding the tension and living in anticipation, because it makes the significance of Christmas much greater and more real.

And yes, the Big Day will arrive eventually - but when it does, Christmas in Church will last not just for a couple of days, but for a full six weeks of celebrations. Most decorations will come down after Epiphany on 6<sup>th</sup> January (when we remember the coming of the Magi to visit the child Jesus), but the nativity figures and white/gold hangings will stay in place until the feast of Candlemas on 2<sup>nd</sup> Feb. During these joyful weeks we have plenty of time to reflect on the story of the Incarnation and the way God's love and glory is gradually revealed in the world through the stories of Jesus's early life and the beginning of his ministry - for Epiphany means 'revelation'.

You are very welcome, of course, to join us for any or all of the Advent/ Christmas events and services. And in the New Year we'll be running another discussion group for anyone who might be interested in finding out more about the Christian faith – so please get in touch (priest@barlow-church.org.uk) if you would like to know more about that.

In the meantime, here is an Advent poem: I hope that you can find, during the coming weeks, just a few moments to be still, as you read it.

## First Coming by Madeleine L'Engle

He did not wait till the world was ready, till men and nations were at peace. He came when the Heavens were unsteady, and prisoners cried out for release.

He did not wait for the perfect time.
He came when the need was deep and great.
He dined with sinners in all their grime,
turned water into wine.

He did not wait till hearts were pure.
In joy he came to a tarnished world of sin and doubt.
To a world like ours, of anguished shame
he came, and his Light would not go out.

He came to a world which did not mesh, to heal its tangles, shield its scorn. In the mystery of the Word made Flesh the Maker of the stars was born.

We cannot wait till the world is sane to raise our songs with joyful voice, for to share our grief, to touch our pain, He came with Love: Rejoice! Rejoice!

May you have a joyful Christmas, when it comes – and a happy and hopeful New Year.


There has been a lull of activity, but new sessions are to be arranged soon.

#### **Crime Prevention information**

As the nights get darker earlier, the fear of crime can increase. Here are a few things you can do to feel safer:

- Leave a light on in more than one room, such as the lounge and bedroom. Remember to choose low-energy lamps.
- Use a timer switch to operate the lights as it starts to get dark.
- Change the times that the lights come on to create the illusion that someone is moving around inside the home.
- Consider the use of 'smart' technology to have different lights coming on in your house at different times.
- Make sure your front door is well lit and fully visible from the street. Also think about security lighting at the rear and side of your property.
- Consider having a good quality CCTV system installed.
- Keep your curtains closed at night if you are away, ask a neighbour to close them for you.

After all the rain it was nice to finally get some dry but cold days at Forest


School. We made some Gruffalo salt dough faces and bear faces as well as plenty of mud pies.

## TARDIS FREE TIME TRAVEL BARLOW HISTORY

Walk around any part of Barlow and traces of the past are all around you. A few steps away from the village green, for instance, between the pair of red brick terraces and the council bungalows, is the entrance to an old drift mine that disappeared underground in what is now someone's back garden. A clue is the original dry stone wall, still in place, running alongside the last of the terraces.

And have you ever looked closely at the little beer garden next to The Hare on Commonside? If you do, you might notice an old stone window lintel, set into the path outside the pool room. Presumably, this came from the cottage at the end of the row, demolished to make room for the beer garden many moons ago. Incidentally, this was the first home in Barlow of the late and much missed Doreen Carter, who moved to the village in 1953. Doreen's final residence in Barlow was the little bungalow next to me, at the top of Springfield Road, which came with a huge garden facing onto Mods Lane, just down the slope from the Hare.

I acquired (legally, for an appropriate fee) a small section of Doreen's old garden last year and have spent many gruelling, but happy hours digging out all manner of bits and pieces, following the removal of Doreen's old shed and greenhouse by the council.

The biggest thing I discovered, a good few feet underground, was another beautifully dressed window lintel, bearing the chisel marks of a skilled mason, working a century ago, or two perhaps? As far as I can work out, there were never cottages at this location at any point in the dim and distant, although there is what looks like an old gateway, with iron brackets for a gate still in place on the stone pillars, almost completely lost in the undergrowth a few yards away.

I say, 'as far as I can work out', because I have been doing a little research. Freely available to all is a fantastic resource, enabling any of us to look into the past, in any location. It is my pleasure to share with you this Christmas, the gift that is maps.nls.uk, otherwise known as the National Library of Scotland – Maps. It's a completely safe website with no sign in, sign up, pop ups or advertising.

Here's my recommendation for the best experience, starting out. It's a vast archive, very easy to get lost in. It is best viewed on a laptop or desktop computer to begin with, but will run on tablets and phones, of course.

When you first open the website, you'll see a page titled 'Map Images'. Scroll down the page and click on 'Georeferenced Maps'. On the left of the screen you'll see two overlapping boxes. This is the tricky bit. Move your cursor to 'Modern Placenames' on the larger box, then click on the search bar and type 'Barlow'. A drop down menu will appear with 'our' Barlow included. Click on that. A map of village from somewhere the





between 1888 and 1915 will magically appear on the main part of the screen. You can zoom in and out and move it around to your heart's content.




But here's the amazing part. You should still have the two overlapping boxes on the left of your screen. At the bottom of the smaller box where it says 'Change transparency of

overlay' is a blue button in a slider, set at 100%. Simply slide the blue button to the left....and travel from the past to the present. You'll be looking at exactly the same location, perfectly aligned with a recent satellite photograph. With the button set at 50%, you'll be able to see both at once, as transparent layers. It's incredible!

It's amazing how much, and how little, has changed in our pretty corner of North East Derbyshire. Take a trip to Sheffield and it's a different story. Vast swathes of countryside were given over to housing and industry as the industrial revolution gained pace. Even so, it's surprising how many little ponds, greens, medieval buildings and rights of way still exist.

The oldest map on the website I can find, is the 'OS One Inch 1st/Old Series, 1798-1878', which is a treasure trove of old place names – there was an actual Hollins Spring, for instance, just below Hill Top in Dronfield, hence Hollins Spring Avenue. And did you know Keepers Cottage on Keepers Lane was originally called Barlow Lodge? Well, you do now. Hopefully you'll have some time to do some exploring of your own over the festive season. Happy researching and Happy Christmas!

## **BARLOW PEOPLE (PAST)**

Fred Haslam (1927 - 2024)



In the Royal Engineer Regiment

Fred Haslam was a lifelong resident of Barlow, having been born on Berrys Row, Commonside and living at Rutland Terrace.

A very active member of Barlow he was on the board of the Parish council, being both secretary and treasurer in the 1960s. He was also on the School governors when it was proposed that Barlow should have a new school in the very early 1970s.

In the 1950s Fred and two friends, other Barlow residents Stan Hughes and Stan Ledger had been visiting other Derbyshire villages and seen carnivals take place. They decided to set up a carnival committee of their own. Barlow had always had well dressings and a feast, but the introduction of the parade and the

introduction of the parade and the competitions was a new concept.

Fred helped dress the main well in the village for many years. He organised many events that took place over the carnival period, sourcing gifts and prizes and much, much more.


Fred was an enthusiastic historian who researched his family tree back to the sixteen hundreds. His keen eye for detail included finding birth, marriage and death certificates, census returns and where possible photographs. Fred's love of history also included any interesting facts about old Barlow. He would tell tales of times gone by, the village way of life and the people he met along the way. Some of his anecdotes featured his friend and neighbour Ted Starkey, going 'rabbiting' with his ferret and having to hide it from the gamekeeper. He also had stories about the travelling fairground Hibble and Mellors coming to the village once a year.

He was a keen photographer who would go out and take photographs of places and buildings that most people would overlook. He did truly love his village. It was this forward way of thinking that we have Fred to thank for recording information relating to times gone by. Many of his photographs record the changing face of Barlow.

When he retired, on most days you would catch him entering competitions and doing the daily crosswords in the newspapers.

A very interesting man, he would always be willing to help anyone. He was a very modest and unassuming gentleman, kind and loyal, funny and clever.

## **STORMS**

#### How do we name storms?

With autumn upon us and the likelihood of impactful weather increasing, the Met Office, in partnership with Met Éireann and KNMI, has prepared a new list of storm names for the 2025/26 season.

But how are these names chosen, and why do we name storms at all? Here, we explain the process behind naming storms, the criteria involved, and the benefits this system brings to the public.

## The process of naming storms

The annual list of storm names is not created in isolation. Instead, it is a collaborative effort involving the public and our partners in Ireland and the Netherlands. Suggestions are invited from members of the public all year round, as well as from Met Éireann and KNMI. This ensures the list reflects a broad range of names from across the UK, Ireland, and the Netherlands.

Once all suggestions are gathered, a dedicated group reviews the names. However, not every name submitted makes it onto the final list. Several important factors are considered to ensure the names are suitable for use in weather communications.

## Criteria for selecting storm names

Pronunciation is a key consideration. Names that are too difficult to pronounce may be excluded, although it is important to remember that some names may be unfamiliar due to the involvement of partners from Northern Ireland and the Netherlands.

The group also examines whether a name has different meanings in different countries, which could lead to confusion or unintended associations. Names connected to significant public figures, or those that could be considered controversial or political, are avoided. Similarly, any name that has already been retired as a hurricane name will not be used again.

To maintain impartiality, storms are never named after private companies or brands. Importantly, the frequency with which a name is submitted does not influence its selection; it is the suitability of the name that matters most.

#### When are new storm names announced?

Since the launch of the 'Name our Storms' initiative in 2015, a new list of names has been published each September. The list covers the period from early September to late August the following year, aligning with the seasonal increase in low-pressure systems and the potential for named storms. The latest list of named storms was revealed on Monday, September 1.

## Why do we name storms?

The primary reason for naming storms is to provide a consistent and authoritative message about approaching severe weather. By using a single, recognisable name, communication through media partners and government agencies becomes clearer and more effective. This helps the public to better understand the risks, take appropriate action, and ultimately keep themselves, their property, and their businesses safe.

#### When is a storm named?

In the UK, a storm is named when it is expected to cause disruption or damage significant enough to warrant an amber or red warning. This decision is based on the National Severe Weather Warnings service, which considers both the potential impact of the weather and the likelihood of those impacts occurring.

While storms are most often named due to the threat of strong winds, other weather types are also considered. For example, heavy rain that could lead to flooding, as advised by agencies such as the Environment Agency, SEPA, and Natural Resources Wales, or significant snowfall, may also prompt the naming of a storm. In this way, the system ensures that the public is alerted to a range of severe weather threats, not just wind.

Naming storms is a vital part of how the Met Office communicates severe weather risks. Through a careful and inclusive process, we ensure that each name is suitable, recognisable, and effective in helping people stay safe when severe weather approaches.
